### **English**

#### English 9

Read Zusak's *The Book Thief*.

After reading Zusak's *The Book Thief*, write an essay responding to one of the questions below:

- Discuss the symbolism of Death as the omniscient narrator of the novel. What are Death's feelings for each victim? Describe Death's attempt to resist Liesel. Death states, "I'm always finding humans at their best and worst. I see their ugly and their beauty, and I wonder how the same thing can be both." (page 491) What is ugly and beautiful about Liesel, Rosa and Hans Hubermann, Max Vandenburg, Rudy Steiner, and Mrs. Hermann? Why is Death haunted by humans?
- What is ironic about Liesel's obsession with stealing books? Discuss other uses of irony in the novel.

- *The Grave Digger's Handbook* is the first book Liesel steals. Why did she take the book? What is significant about the titles of the books she steals? Discuss why she hides *The Grave Digger's Handbook* under her mattress. Describe Hans Hubermann's reaction when he discovers the book. What does the act of book thievery teach Liesel about life and death? Explain Rudy's reaction when he discovers that Liesel is a book thief. How does stealing books from the mayor's house lead to a friendship with the mayor's wife? Explain how Liesel's own attempt to write a book saves her life.
- Liesel believes that Hans Hubermann's eyes show kindness, and from the beginning she feels closer to him than to Rosa Hubermann. How does Hans gain Liesel's love and trust? Debate whether Liesel is a substitute for Hans's children, who have strayed from the family. Why is it so difficult for Rosa to demonstrate the same warmth toward Liesel? Discuss how Liesel's relationship with Rosa changes by the end of the novel.
- Abandonment is a central theme in the novel. The reader knows that Liesel feels abandoned by her mother and by the death of her brother. How does she equate love with abandonment? At what point does she understand why she was abandoned by her mother? Who else abandons Liesel in the novel? Debate whether she was abandoned by circumstance or by the heart.
- Guilt is another recurring theme in the novel. Hans Hubermann's life was spared in France during World War I, and Erik Vandenburg's life was taken. Explain why Hans feels guilty about Erik's death. Guilt is a powerful emotion that may cause a person to become unhappy and despondent. Discuss how Hans channels his guilt into helping others. Explain Max Vandenburg's thought, "Living was living. The price was guilt and shame." (p. 208) Why does he feel guilt and shame?
- Compare and contrast the lives of Liesel and Max Vandenburg. How does Max's life give Liesel purpose? At what point do Liesel and Max become friends? Max gives Liesel a story called "The Standover Man" for her birthday. What is the significance of this story?
- Death says that Liesel was a girl "with a mountain to climb." (p. 86) What is her mountain? Who are her climbing partners? What is her greatest obstacle? At what point does she reach the summit of her mountain? Describe her descent. What does she discover at the foot of her mountain?
- Hans Junior, a Nazi soldier, calls his dad a coward because he doesn't belong to the Nazi Party. He feels that you are either for Hitler or against him. How does it take courage to oppose Hitler? There isn't one coward in the Hubermann household. Discuss how they demonstrate courage throughout the novel.
- Describe Liesel's friendship with Rudy. How does their friendship change and grow throughout the novel? Death says that Rudy doesn't offer his friendship "for free." (p. 51)
- What does Rudy want from Liesel? Discuss Death's statement, "The one thing worse than a boy who hates you [is] a boy who loves you." (p. 52) Why is it difficult for Liesel to love Rudy? Discuss why Liesel tells Mr. Steiner that she kissed Rudy's dead body.
- How does Zusak use the literary device of foreshadowing to pull the reader into the story?

- Liesel Meminger lived to be an old woman. Death says that he would like to tell the book thief about beauty and brutality, but those are things that she had lived. How does her life represent beauty in the wake of brutality? Discuss how Zusak's poetic writing style enhances the beauty of Liesel's story.

## Grades 10-12

St. Andrew's Schools, The Priory's English department encourages summer reading of all kinds. We also assign specific summer reading titles with our course content and objectives in mind. The books you read this summer will introduce you to important themes and concepts that you will discuss and learn throughout the year. We also urge parents to involve themselves in this process by reading with their children and discussing the books they read.

To make summer reading a better learning experience for you, you will:

1. Read actively. This happens several ways:
  - a. By highlighting or underlining important passages.
  - b. By writing notes in the margins.
  - c. By writing down questions you have as you are reading. (in a composition notebook)
  - d. By labeling or naming chapters as a way to state their main idea(s).
2. Be prepared to engage in a discussion when you talk about the book with your teacher and classmates. How would you discuss or present it to classmates? What ideas do you want to bring forward?
3. Bring the book(s) with you on the first day of classes. Bring your composition notebook.

## STUDY GUIDE<sup>1</sup>

The study guide is required for summer homework for each course and novel. Write the following in a composition notebook; throughout the year you will use this composition notebook for journal writing.

1. Explain the significance of the title. Authors do not choose a title randomly; they choose it for an important or symbolic reason. (Reflection, speculation)
2. Describe your first impressions of the main character(s); give examples to explain your ideas. (Observation)
3. Identify what caused a change in the main character(s) and explain how the character(s) changed: These changes may have been a consequence of choice, a conflict of some kind that has to be resolved, a display of some outstanding trait like courage, or even a result of events that occur during the novel. (Interpretation)

4. Cite a memorable passage from the book; copy word for word a short passage that you thought was worth remembering. Explain why you chose this passage from the book. (Evaluation, possibly autobiographical)
5. Read all of the following questions and then write one response about the significance of reading this literary work: What discovery did you make as a result of reading this book? Did the book affirm your views on life in some way? In other words, what did you get out of reading this book? (Reflection)

#### AP English: Literature and Composition

#### SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENT AND INDEPENDENT STUDY PROJECT

Before the first day of school, complete the summer reading and prepare the independent study question and outline.

#### **Summer Reading:**

Students are to read William Shakespeare's King Lear before class begins in August, 2018.

#### **Independent Study Project:**

This first research question and outline for the Q1 INDEPENDENT STUDY PROJECT is due first week of school.

Students are to choose one literary artist from one genre below and prepare a research question and outline. Class time spent on research will be largely devoted to the unit of study, not independent work, so this head start is beneficial, use it wisely.

One complete INDEPENDENT STUDY PROJECT will be due each quarter.

For example, a student may write a research paper on Eugene O'Neill's *Anna Christie* for one quarter, present the poems from memory "Lullaby" and "Fall of Rome" by W.H. Auden one quarter, write another research paper on Cormac McCarthy's *All the Pretty Horses* for one quarter, or do a PowerPoint presentation on the grotesque images in the works of Joyce Carol Oates one quarter.

Select one genre from below.

**Poetry:** Students will prepare a research question and outline for their selection. They will use these outlines to lead a class discussion on their selection. Students will memorize and read two poems from their selection. Choose one of the following: W.H. Auden, Richard Wilbur, Philip Larkin, Derek Walcott, Edward Kamau Brathwaite, Lorna Dee Cervantes, Joy Harjo, Garrett Hongo, or Gerard Manley Hopkins.

**Plays:** Students will prepare a research question and outline for their selection. They will use these outlines to do one of the following: prepare a research paper OR prepare a visual presentation. Choose one of these playwrights/works: Samuel Beckett's *Endgame*, David Henry Hwang's *M. Butterfly*, William Congreve's *The Mourning Bride*, Oliver Goldsmith's *The Good Natur'd Man*, Lillian Helmer's *Toys in the Attic*, David Mamet's *Wag the Dog*, Sean O'Casey's *The Plough and the Stars*, Eugene O'Neill's *Anna Christie*, Harold Pinter's *The Homecoming*.

**Novels:** Students will prepare a research question and outline for their selection. They will use these outlines to do one of the following: prepare a research paper OR prepare a visual presentation. Choose one of these novelists/works: Edith Wharton's *The House of Mirth*, James Joyce's *The Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man*, William Faulkner's *The Sound and the Fury* or *As I Lay Dying*, George Eliot's *The Mill on the Floss*, Toni Morrison's *The Song of Solomon* or *The Bluest Eye*, Joseph Conrad's *Lord Jim*, Charles Dickens's *Hard Times*, Alan Paton's *Cry, the Beloved Country*, George Orwell's *1984*, John Fowles's *The French Lieutenant's Woman*, Thomas Hardy's *Tess of the d'Urbervilles*, Cormac McCarthy's *All the Pretty Horses*, or William Styron's *Sophie's Choice*.

**Short Story:** Students will prepare a research question and outline for their selection. They will use these outlines to do one of the following: prepare a research paper OR prepare a visual presentation. Choose one of the following short story authors: Eudora Welty, E.M. Forester, Carson McCullers, Bobbie Ann Mason, Joyce Carol Oates, Margaret Atwood, Saul Bellow, John Cheever, or Anita Desai.

## AP U.S. History (APUSH)

The official due date/time will be based on the period the course will meet during the school year. Failure to submit summer homework on time will result in the reassessment of your placement in AP courses.

**Assignments:** All supplemental materials (maps, photos, etc.) needed to complete all assignments will be on Canvas.

1. Read through the entire syllabus and sign the agreement.
  - Make sure your parent(s) read through the syllabus and sign the agreement as well.
  - Check on Canvas to download and print the syllabus.
  - Syllabus will be uploaded onto Canvas by the beginning of July.
2. Period 1: 1491-1607 Read Chapter 1 in the textbook for APUSH, Give Me Liberty! by Eric Foner

  - Columbian Exchange
    - For key terms construct ID/SIGs for each term. The purpose of the ID/SIGs it to be able to answer the five W's (who, what, when, where and why).

- ID/SIG stands for Identification, Significance. ID/SIGs helps you to identify the five key points of events/terminology.
- In your answer, you should answer, who was involved/who was affected, what this was, when it occurred (date), where it occurred, and most importantly why this event was significant.
  - The most important aspect to answer is why this event is important – what did it influence/affect?
- See example on next page. The example has used information from outside sources. You do NOT need to do outside research – create ID/SIGs based on information from the textbook/lectures.

#### EXAMPLE

The Battle of Saratoga: The Battle of Saratoga occurred between September and October of 1777. The battle was between the Continental Army and 32,000 troops led by Howe, and the Royal Navy, led by Howe's brother, Richard Lord Howe. This was a battle for the Hudson River – the British wanted the Hudson River in order to control the colonies and their troops in Canada easier. Control of the river would also allow Britain to cut off and isolate New England from the rest of the colonies. Washington's troops became trapped on Brooklyn Heights and the British thought they were going to win, but Washington troops were able to escape to Manhattan. Throughout this battle Howe had three attempts to capture Washington's troops (Brooklyn Heights, Battle of Harlem Heights and Battle of White Plains), but Howe failed to do so. He did not use his maneuverability of the sea, avoided battle, and de-emphasized the importance of exploitation. Ultimately this battle ended with Howe's resignation, restored colonists' faith in the war, and led France into the war as an American ally in 1778. The introduction of the French created the Treaty Alliance and Treaty of Amity and Commerce.

  - c. After reading through the commentary for each picture, list 4-5 specific pieces of information you learned for each picture.

6. Using the map and your textbook, analyze how Spanish and Portuguese exploration from 1400-1600 impacted Native American economies and society.
  - Include specific information that shows how the exchange of commodities, peoples, diseases and ideas impacted the economy and society of Native Americans.
  - Spanish and Portuguese exploration map can be found on canvas, under the assignment "Spanish and Portuguese Exploration: 1400-1600"
7. Fill in the map of the Columbian Exchange, showing what commodities were exchanged between America and Europe. On a separate page, also identify other key commodities that were exchanged between Africa and West Indies and North America and Europe.
  - Select at least 2 items, from each export site (Americas and Europe), that you believe made the greatest impact to the geographical location the items were imported to. Explain why you selected each items.
  - Columbian Exchange map found on Canvas, under assignment titled, "Columbian Exchange"
8. Read through the "7 Pillars of Colonialism" handout. Based on the seven pillars that the handout described, do you think that America was colonized? In 1-2 paragraphs, explain why you believe America was/was not colonized, using the seven pillars to help form your opinion. Use specific examples from Charles Mann's lecture, Chapter 1 in *Give Me Liberty!*, primary sources, and maps to support your answer.
9. Through this assignment, we will be looking at the Pueblo Revolt and analyzing historians' thesis statements (main arguments), evidence, and rationale for their arguments. At the end of this assignment, you will answer the following question in 1-2 paragraphs: What events led up to the Pueblo Revolt and what were the effects of the Pueblo Revolt on the New World?
  - a. To begin, we will first contextualize the event. Read through the following documents:
    - i. [The Great Pueblo Revolt \(La Gran Rebelión Pueblo\)](#)
    - ii. [Revolt of the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico and Otermín's Attempted Reconquest, 1680-1682](#) Warning: This is a dense read - allow time to read and understanding information in this primary source.)
  - b. After reading through the background material, read through the following essays and listen to the podcast. These will be the essays & podcast that you will have to dissect and find the thesis, evidence, and rationale. (You may bullet point the pieces of evidence that you find in each source; however, write out the author's main argument and how they incorporated the evidence to support their argument in complete sentences. You do not need to submit your notes.)
    - i. [Trouble for the Spanish: The Pueblo Revolt of 1680](#) by Pedro Ponce
    - ii. [The Pueblos Lost Their Religion, Won a Revolt](#) by Katie Lambert
    - iii. [The Pueblos Lost Their Religion, Won a Revolt | Stuff You Missed in History Class.pdf](#) (linked on Canvas)
  - c. Answer in no more than 1-2 paragraphs: What events led up to the Pueblo Revolt & what were the effects of the Pueblo Revolt on the New World?

10. Based on Charles Mann's lecture, Chapter 1 in *Give Me Liberty!*, primary sources, and maps, construct a 1000-1250-word essay explaining the importance of the Columbian Exchange.
  - Essays should have an introduction and thesis statement makes a claim/argument. Supporting body paragraphs should provide evidence (from primary sources, lecture, textbook, etc.) to support your claim/argument. Conclude the essay with a conclusion that paraphrases your thesis and summarizes your argument and evidence from your body paragraphs.

## **Advanced Placement Courses**
